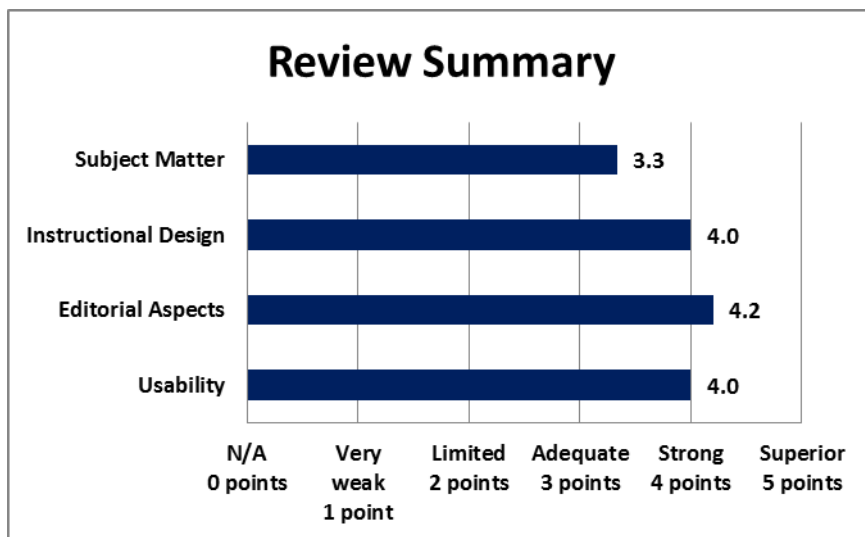

- The subject matter of the book is traditional and covers the fundamentals well. Overall, the book is well-written and organized.
- As for question five above - I'm not sure this issue of sensitivity is relevant in an introduction to the legal system. If you are concerned about sensitivity, you might examine the youtube videos (which I like) and note that once they are finished the default selection of related videos may hit the area of insensitivity. The reader doesn't have control over the 'related' videos associated with the embedded teaching video.
- The content is traditional and covers the standards. I would note, however, that the title of the book includes 'ethics' - there isn't a single chapter on ethics, although the 'ethics' seems implied throughout the narrative. This seems to be a glaring oversight.

especially, one with the term 'ethics' in the title. The Declaration is often considered the high watermark of political and moral philosophy.
